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### **DISCUSSION GUIDE**

- 1. Take some time to discuss what impacted you from this week's reading in *Hope in the Dark (sections 1.3-1.5)*.
- 2. Read <u>Job 23:3-4, 16-17.</u> How would you lay out your case before God if you could stand in front of Him?
- 3. Which option (pretend/deny or walk away from God/faith) has been one you've chosen when confronted with hard things that don't make sense in your life and how did that play out?
- 4. Read <u>Habakkuk 1:6-11.</u> How do you feel and respond when God's answer to your cries for help seem to echo those found in His response to Habakkuk?
- 5. Read <u>Habakkuk 1:12-13.</u> How can Habakkuk's words help you make the switch from pretending and denying or walking away from God to embracing and wrestling with Him about hard things you've experienced in the past or are experiencing right now.
- 6. What questions have you been hesitant to ask God? Will you take the step of having a hard conversation with God this week and doing some wrestling and embracing?

#### 3. If I Was God, I'd Do Things Differently

Note <u>Psalm 130:1; 13:2; 10:1; Jeremiah 15:18; Lamentations 3:1-3, 7-9, 16-18; Ecclesiastes 1:12-14; Job 21:4; 23:3-4, 16-17</u>

...when we reach the place where we think that if we were God, we could do a <u>better job</u>, we're going to usually take one of two pathways:

- Too scared to run from God or voice questions, so we pretend/<u>deny</u> (only effective temporarily).
- I tried God, church, the Bible, and they didn't work like I thought, so I'm out—walk away from God/faith.

There's a 3rd option:

In the middle of the pain and confusion, wrestle and <u>embrace</u>.

But this doesn't mean that everything <u>immediately</u> turns around and becomes wonderful.

#### 4. When God's Answer Isn't What We Asked For

Note Habakkuk 1:2, 5

God's answer must have been so disappointing and <u>jaw-dropping</u> (note <u>Habakkuk 1:6-7, 9-11</u>).

So what does Habakkuk do?

He embraces God and wrestles with Him (note Habakkuk 1:12-13).

We live in a world devastated by sin and <u>broken</u> in so many ways, surrounded by people (including ourselves) with spiritually defective DNA. The odds of bad things happening are <u>100</u>%.

#### Finding hope in the dark:

When we hit the wall and experience a crisis of faith:

- Don't deny and pretend that everything is okay (<u>fake</u> it 'til you make it doesn't work).
- God understands your pain.
- God welcomes your questions (He would rather have you <u>yell</u> at Him than walk away from Him).
- As a follower of Jesus it is possible and preferable to wrestle with God with our <u>honest</u> questions and also embrace a genuine trust in God.
