Getting <i>caught in the act</i> can be both a very uncomfortable but also very experience.
What does this uncomfortable and encounter in John reveal to us about being <i>caught in the act?</i>
1. It Seems to Catch Other People in the Act
Note John 8:1-4
These religious leaders were very aware of the wrongdoing and of others.
They also wanted to try to catch in the act (note <u>John 8:5-6a</u>).
It seemed that Jesus' only choices were to defyor defy God's

DISCUSSION GUIDE

Icebreaker: Sunday is the beginning of Daylight Savings Time. Do you have a good story to tell when you forgot to "spring ahead?"

- 1. In <u>John 8:1-4</u>, the religious leaders were trying to trap Jesus as they pointed out the failure of this woman. Why is it easy to fixate on the shortcomings of other people?
- **2.** Pastor Tom pointed out that "Jesus never denies this woman's guilt." Why is that significant?
- **3.** What do you think Jesus wrote in the dust that day? (see <u>John 8:5-9)</u>
- 4. How do guard against keeping our sin in the dark in light of Numbers 32:23?
- **5.** Pastor Tom affirmed <u>John 1:17</u> and <u>John 3:17</u> when he explained that Jesus' purpose for "catching us in the act" is to show our need for Him and to move us toward repentance, forgiveness and transformation. How have you experienced this when Jesus "caught you in the act?"
- **6.** Read <u>John 8:10-11</u> to see what Jesus asks of the woman. What is He asking of you today?

1. It Seems <u>Easier</u> to Catch Other People in the Act

Note John 8:1-4

These religious leaders were very aware of the wrongdoing and <u>failures</u> of others.

They also wanted to try to catch <u>Jesus</u> in the act (note <u>John 8:5-6a</u>).

It seemed that Jesus' only choices were to defy Rome...or defy God's law.

It seems easier...to point out and display others' failures, to <u>compare</u> ourselves favorably in light of wrongdoing and sins of others, to try to trap people through moral dilemmas and use those moral dilemmas to <u>manipulate</u> other people and circumstances to our own advantage.

2. Eventually Jesus Catches All of Us in the Act

Note John 8:6b

Jesus never <u>denies</u> this woman's guilt.

But Jesus also intended to catch the religious leaders *in the act*, too (note John 8:7-8).

We are not told what Jesus wrote, but we can be sure He wasn't doodling!

Note John 8:9

They had discovered that <u>sin</u> is humanity's great equalizer and common denominator... (note <u>Numbers 32:23</u>)

3. Jesus Has a <u>Purpose</u> for Catching Us in the Act

Note <u>John 1:17</u>; <u>3:17</u>

Jesus' purpose...isn't simply to make us feel bad or give us a terminal case of the *guilties* and never-relenting shame; but it's to reveal our need and open our hearts and minds to a <u>new life</u> offered by Jesus.

Note John 8:10-11

This woman had <u>tested positive</u> for sin and she desperately needed to repent and be forgiven.

The same was true with all of her accusers.

Your story really does matter to <u>Jesus</u>:

- Until that day, however, God's purpose is to <u>reconcile</u>, transform, and reunite this world to God.
- Have we been caught in the act (or should we be)?
