How did compromise lead to more compromise in Pilate's life? How is compromise for the path of least resistance a temptation in your life?
- **3.** Selfish passions can outweigh our commitment to truth. How does your own passion make this a challenge in your daily life? Read <u>John 19:19-22</u> and <u>Matthew 27:19</u>.
- **4.** Pastor Tom ended with a challenge to all of us. He asked, "Are we personally committed to the absolute truth of God's principles and to the Person and work of Jesus or are we finding ourselves laying aside objective standards of right and wrong? How do you respond to this question?
- **5.** How can we encourage one another, as a group, to pursue God's truth?
