We know that many of Jesus' apostles and early church leaders and Jesus' own half brothers were married... (note <u>1 Corinthians 9:5</u>).

The point He's making is that there's <u>nothing</u> and <u>no one</u> that is to come between us and God's kingdom and the King of kings.

The <u>priorities</u> of Jesus, the centrality of His mission, His will, His purposes, and my connection and relationship with Jesus must be first in my life if I am <u>genuinely</u> going to be His disciple.

It's not just money and possessions and things that can become an obstacle...but even <u>family ties</u> can become a hindrance...
