2. As you think about what you want your legacy to look like, read [Ephesians 5:15-17](#). What are some things you can do to finish well, regardless of what your past looks like?
3. What would you reasonably have expected your legacy to be if you had never said “YES!” to Jesus? What are some of the ways that expectancy has changed since your decision to follow Jesus? (If your group hasn’t had the chance to hear how you started following Jesus, take time to do that now.)
4. Think about some of the excuses you have from your past about why God can’t use you...then read [1 Timothy 1:13-16](#). How much control does your past actually have?
5. Our legacy as Jesus-followers revolves around His mission first and foremost. Read [Acts 9:19b-22, 26-28](#) and consider Paul’s life focus. How is Jesus’ mission being accomplished through your life?
6. Pastor Tom shared that “A good life story is never written in isolation.” and illustrated that by sharing about people Paul invested in, who invested in him, as well as some of his struggles along the way. (See message notes for pertinent passages.) Who are your people? Who are you investing in? Who have you invited to invest in you?
7. What next step will you take to ensure that the story that’s written beginning today will be one you’re excited to have told?

There is no “deep” without the mission of Jesus first in our hearts and the motivation for everything we do.

3. Say Yes to God’s Family

A good life story is never written in isolation.

Paul mentions 29 people just in Romans 16 and 34 people in just 1 and 2 Timothy and Titus.

So often we can focus our attention and efforts and time invested in things that don’t last...the only thing we can bring into eternity...is other people.

Writing a meaningful life story means that we invest in relationships with others.

Paul’s investment was two-fold:

- A. He invested in building up others (note [1 Corinthians 11:1](#); [2 Timothy 3:10-11a, 14-15](#); [4:1-2, 5](#)).
- B. His investing in others also resulted in others investing in him—Paul was honest about the tension even the strongest Jesus followers experience in life:
 - i. Complete assurance of victory in Jesus (note [2 Timothy 4:6-8](#))...
 - ii. ...but also acknowledging my human frailty, struggles, needs, disappointments, etc. (note [2 Timothy 4:9-16, 19-21](#)).
