1. What God's Love Is Not

When we hear/read the beautiful and full meaning of 3 words by John, *God is love* (1 John 4:8, 16), if we end up only interpreting that from a human perspective, it will take us to places that will <u>hinder</u> our lives and relationships. By definition, God's love cannot be grasped by our own intelligence and acumen.

Most people think the word love means things like:

- A. <u>Romantic</u> feelings/emotions—God commands us to love others; not have warm <u>fuzzy</u> feelings about others.
- B. Physical attention/sex.
- C. <u>Blind</u> acceptance—God's love gives <u>blanket</u> acceptance (He loves you no matter what you've done); but not <u>blind</u> acceptance (He loves you too much to let you stay the way you are).
- D. Positive <u>vibe</u>/feelings—God's love can produce good feelings…but it can also bring *conviction*, <u>tension</u>, uncomfortableness, and the realization of our need to change. (Thompson).

2. What God's Love Is

(note 1 John 3:16; 4:9-10, 19; Romans 5:6-8)

God's love isn't a noun, it's a verb.

Love is <u>choosing</u> for the highest good of another.

The full picture of what God's love is is far more <u>complex</u> than our small and often inaccurate understanding of love.

Jesus is the embodiment of <u>perfect</u> love. But He:

- Physically drove out the moneychangers in the Temple (twice).
- Warned of a terrible place called <u>hell</u>.
- Forgave and healed people and also told them to <u>sin</u> no more.
- <u>Bluntly</u> rebuked the religious leaders (note <u>Matthew 23</u>).
- Also hung on the cross and the first thing He said was, *Father, forgive them.*
- Reached out to the most <u>despised</u> people at that time.
- Patiently taught and modeled what real love and truth is to His
 disciples even when they argued with each other about who was the
 greatest...
- Touched and healed lepers.
- Crossed ethnic and <u>racial</u> barriers.
- Made crystal clear that the <u>identifying</u> mark of what it means to be His followers to a lost world is this incredible love...(note <u>John 13:1-5</u>, <u>34-35</u>).
